HAVE YOU NOTICED HOW GOOD THE COFFEE TASTES AT UU?

Have you ever wondered who makes it every Sunday? You can thank Neil Huddleston. For years now, I've watched Neil go about quietly giving service to the Fellowship, taking care of the collection basket, tending to outside chores, watering the plants, doing the dishes, cleaning up. I never really talked much to Neil, but I found myself becoming fond of him and appreciative of his efforts and quiet way. I asked Neil to talk about what I had noticed. In his characteristically modest way, he told me that he was brought up on a farm in Appalachia in Tennessee. Everyone was expected to pull their own load, to take responsibility and to help out when it was needed. This way of life seems to be second nature to Neil.

Neil came to the area in the 70's for his work with IBM as an electrical engineer in conjunction with the NASA program. He was invited to a Unitarian service by a friend of his wife. He had come from a strict Presbyterian background whose tenets he questioned. He was drawn to the beliefs of the Unitarians, and became a member. When he came to Galveston with his wife in 1974, he became part of the Galveston Fellowship. He's retired from IBM, and is presently working at the Transitional Learning Center as a research analyst, doing programming and data base operations.

When asked what the most significant event in his life was, he talked about his

fourteen month experience, working with the Defense Communications System in Viet Nam. He went into the army as a second lieutenant when his draft became imminent. He believed he was doing the right thing to serve his country in the war. However, his life was turned upside down as he was catapulted from his pleasant life as a bachelor with a good job, security, and good times. Once in Vietnam, he quickly realized that the war was immoral, and that the Vietnamese people were victims. He saw them trying to survive while being harassed, threatened and robbed on three sides by the Vietnamese government, the Viet Cong, and criminal motorcycle gangs. He saw more and more soldiers' caskets being lined up everyday and knew the deaths were being under reported. Neil began to have a new perception of things and a new way of thinking.

At present, Neil is still out of his home and in a temporary home while he deals with post Ike business, so he doesn't have much time. He has enjoyed sailing and bird watching. He lives with his wife, and has two grown stepchildren and grandchildren. His official jobs at UU are backup to the treasurer and alternate Webmaster. We also depend on him to open and close up on Sunday, make the coffee, and take charge of the collection baskets. I, for one, enjoy seeing him every Sunday and knowing that UU is in good hands. My hat's off to you, Neil. Thanks.
