October 26, 2014 John Vanderpool MD: Humanism, Human Nature, and Religion POTLUCK TODAY

John Vanderpool is a Board Certified Psychiatrist who has published numerous professional papers in medical journals. He taught for eight years in UTMB's Dept. of Psychiatry before joining his wife, Dr. Beverly Vanderpool in private practice. He serves as our Fellowship's President. As believed in the custom, the ofrenda will be beautifully prepared and ready for the return of the spirits of our departed loved ones.

All are invited to bring small mementos or photos to commemorate their loved ones who have passed. Table coverings, colorful decorations, papel picado (punched paper), candles and tissue paper flowers will be provided. This promises to be a unique opportunity to join together as a community to acknowledge and honor our deceased loved ones. The ofrenda will remain in place from October 26 through the service on November 9 at which time all are invited to pick-up their mementos and photos after service.

Bringit sign-up sheets let you create unlimited sign-up sheets online. With this site, people see what things are needed and can sign up... Yes it is that easy. Each sign-up sheet has a Public URL so people can sign up without needing to login or remember another password. We can even share with folks through email, Facebook, our UU newsletter, or through the "Member Resources" portion of our website. What is even more exciting is that when people sign up, they enter their email address (which is not visible to the public) and they get a friendly, automated reminder two days before the event date. Pretty awesome, right?

As you may know this service was brought to the UU Members back in April as a way to schedule the greeter and concierge volunteer opportunities. In the past it was very difficult to iron out a schedule since nobody knew what anyone else was doing. Now, those days are long gone, and everyone is just one click on the link away from all the possibilities to help out around the church.

It is very exciting to see how in just a few months we have been able to grow the use of this service to benefit our overall organization. We are now using it to schedule the Board Member of the Day, Sunday Facilitators, and the Potluck Clean-up Team. I know that this is just the beginning as we begin to experiment with all the things that this site can do and all the ways we can make it work for us.

Soon the link will be available on our website by logging into the password protected area, "Member Resources." Betty will also be sending the link in the newsletter that you receive each week.
